Announcements

Meeting Notice - The Texas DX Society meets on the second Friday of each month, except when the date is changed by the Board of Directors. The gathering should begin sometime between 6:30 and 7:00 P.M. with the meeting starting sometime after 7:30 P.M.

Members are encouraged to attend this meeting as it will be the time to consider plans for the upcoming **Annual TDXS Banquet and Awards Ceremony** to be held on **Saturday, January 12, 1991** at Brady's Landing. It also represents the last chance for some of those of you still on the ragged edge to meet the four meeting per year requirement for full membership. Visitors are welcome to attend and may obtain help in finding the location by checking in on 147.96/36 MHz.

Bullsheet Mailing List - TDXS wishes to provide the Bullsheet to those amateurs in the Houston area with an active interest in DXing and contesting. Donations to help defray publication and mailing costs are appreciated. Visitors to our club meetings will receive the Bullsheet for three months free of charge simply by signing the Attendance List and including their mailing address. Articles or other newsworthy items are hereby solicited by your editor. Articles should be submitted in the form of either ASCII files or as MS Word or WordPerfect word processor files. Files

may be uploaded to the TDXS Bullsheet area on K2TNO's Bulletin Board at 713-798-4955, or sent direct to the Editor on either 5 1/4" or 3 1/2" diskette, either DS/DD or DS/HD. If necessary, files may be sent to "Dr. William Schrader" via FAX at 713-790-1275. For those with VHF Packet and having access to any of the local Digipeaters, or able connect directly, ASCII text can be sent directly to the Editor. Contact W5ASP at (713) 974-3455 to arrange such file transfers.

DX Packet Cluster - The TDXS sponsors the Waller County Contest and DX PacketCluster Bulletin Board (PCBS) located in Hempstead, TX operating on 144.990 MHz with the call KE5IV. A local digipeater is operational on 144.990 MHz from the Greenway Plaza area to provide convenient access to this PacketCluster. This Digi has the "alias" TDXS. The suggested procedure is to connect with KE5IV via TDXS (C KE5IV V TDXS) rather than connecting first to TDXS and then to KE5IV. KE5IV may also be reached via IAH, IAH4 on 145.010 MHz. There is a second port operating on 144.91 MHz, also under KE5IV's call. This affords those with higher ERP (i.e. power and/or gain antennas), particularly on the west or northwest side of Houston, the option of connecting directly with Hempstead and has the virtue of giving somewhat faster response.

The Galveston County DX PacketCluster, now located in La Marque, is now active under the call KC5SC and is on 144.93 MHz. It is usually connected with KE5IV via the 446.100 MHz backbone link. Stations in the southern parts of Houston may find it easier to connect with this cluster. AB5A located in Dickinson, about 10 miles northwest of KC5SC, provides digis on both 144.930 and 144.970 MHz to assist in accessing the KC5SC PacketCluster. This Cluster also features a 40 Meter HF Gateway on the 144.930 MHz port.

Both clusters are frequently linked into Austin, Dallas and beyond for added DX coverage, especially during contests. In addition to listing current DX spots, the system provides access to a wide variety of DX related information such as the W6GO QSL Manager list, Russian oblasts, WWV propagation, beam headings, etc.

Users are requested to limit their use of these "databases" to off-peak hours so as to minimize the side effects on others. A quick check of the status shown in the opening message which appears upon connection will indicate the number of nodes/users active at the time. Otherwise all users are encouraged to query the various data banks and make full use of their many features.

Could It be I.O.T.A.

The ARRL operating awards program with its many different categories has been responsible for a major portion of the enjoyment many of us derive from amateur radio. Like many other Hams, I have spent what seems like thousands of hours scanning the bands for that elusive "new one". For me, the thrill of the hunt is an important part of this hobby.

My normal routine is to listen whenever I can, including immediately after work and just before bedtime. On a night just like any other I start listening at the bottom of the band and gradually work my way up to the top. As is my normal practice, I spend a lot of time just above the DX window. This portion of the band has been very good to me in the past and one never knows what may chance by. Several stations were rag-chewing and while that can be interesting, it is not what I enjoy...so the search continues.

Ah, a weak station calling CQ. Nothing unusual about that except this was the week the DX magazines were announcing the possibility of an operation that I needed. Who knows, this could be it. I reach for the headset with one hand and my "need list" with the other.

Where did he go? Ok, there he is. Good, he is still calling CQ. Rats! missed his call sign, wish people would listen before they transmit. Oh, there he is again! Why doesn't he send his call sign? Wait a minute, there he goes. What did he say? "DXpedition?"

As a dedicated DX'er, this word has the ability to create in me a sense of excitement that is obtained in no other way. (Hope my wife doesn't read this.) No matter how hard I try to resist, there can be only one possible response, "MAXIMUM EFFORT!"

Immediately, the amplifier is in the high power position. The antenna begins to rotate. "Come on TS-830 tune, darn it, tune!" The DXpedition operator is almost ready. Once again I wonder if my little station is up to it. From past experience, I know that I must get him early to have a real chance. Ok, I know what I must do. My sweaty hand moves from the radio to the keyer. The DX station gives his call sign. What? That can't be correct. Has my faithful prefix cross reference failed me at this critical moment? Perhaps it is a new prefix. Besides, I really didn't copy him very well. Do I dare miss out? WFWL right?

There is only one possible answer. Into the pile up I go. He sends..."up five". Ok, I'll try seven. My hands are shaking with excitement. Well I'll be darned, he got me right off! That was not nearly as difficult as most pile ups. Remember that 3Y pile up? It took almost two weeks!

I sat back and felt rather proud of my little station. Only one problem, he has my call sign and I still don't have his. Besides, I need the QSL information. OK headphones, do your thing! There he goes again. What did he say? An island off the Italian coast!

Welcome to the world of I.O.T.A. Nearly everyone has heard of I.O.T.A. but I doubt that many have actually participated in its activities. As a DX'er, you run into a big problem about the time your DXCC country count passes number two hundred. That's right...things start to slow down. The next new one can be a long time in coming. This is when I.O.T.A. can be very helpful by filling that void and help to maintain your interest while waiting. It is well worth looking into.

First introduced by Geoff Watts in the mid 1960's, I.O.T.A. is an awards program, now administrated by the RSGB, for DX'ers who wish to expand their DX'ing activities by making

contacts with islands or island groups world wide. In this activity, sixteen separate awards are available including an Honor Roll. The basic award is the I.O.T.A. 100 which represents confirmation of 100 of the listed islands or island groups.

The official listing of qualifying island groups can be obtained for \$4.00 from VP2ML at the following address: Mr. Chod Harris DX Bulletin P.O. Box 50 Fulton, Ca 95439

Instructions for award applications and QSL verification for North American stations are handled by W4BAA/8. This means your QSL cards remain stateside for approval. Information about this procedure can be obtained from the following address: Mr. Dewitt L. Jones P.O. Box 379 Glen Arbor, Mich 49636

I would encourage you to investigate the I.O.T.A. program and give it a chance to work for you. It can be a lot of fun. See ya in the pileups!

Dispatches From The Colonies

(The following is an extract of a recent letter from Jan, K5MA, who now resides on the shores of Buzzards Bay in the quaint village of West Falmouth in the Massachusetts colony. Those of you not familiar with such rural areas will find that even here amateur radio has gained a foothold and that two-way communications with the outside world are not at all uncommon...ed)

"I keep reading the Bullsheets and noticing lots of TDXS members contest scores listed, but never see anything for either K5NA or myself." (They made the February, May and October issues, but you know how these New Englanders are about top billing...ed) "I guess we have nobody to blame but ourselves because we don't communicate so well. I guess it's easy with the local repeater available to exchange scores, but I guess I have to resort to the US Mail."

(Jan included his recent scores which are listed elsewhere in this issue...ed)

"The only one of the four contests that was an all-out effort was the CW SS where I went the full 24 hours and got my tail beat...didn't even come close to the top ten. The Phone CQ WW was intended to be single band ten meters, but we have an untimely death of our next door neighbor on the Saturday night and I missed most of Sunday. I spent 31 hours in the CQ WW CW contest and about 10 hours in the SS Phone.

The antennas here consist of the following. 10 Meters: Modified (N6ND design) 105BA 5-el monobander at 80 ft.; 15 Meters: Modified 115BA (computer optimized) 5-el monobander at 70 ft.; 10/15/20 Meters: TH6-DXX at 80 ft.; 40 Meters: Sloper on Europe with top at 80 ft.; 80 Meters: Quarter-wave slopers NE and SW from 75 ft.; 80/160 Meters: 256 ft. Zepp, center-fed with tuned feeders with the middle 70 ft. at 75 ft. height and the end 90 ft. sections sloping from the two towers.

As you can see, the low band antennas are not very competitive. I still have my old Cushcraft 40-2CD 2-element Yagi, but it won't be put up until next summer. The 80 foot tower (presently with the TH6) will end up with a 205BA at 80 ft. and the 2-el 40 at 90 ft. in the configuration I originally had at this QTH before I was transferred back to Houston. The 70 foot tower has the 10/15 monobander stack with a Cushcraft 3219 2-meter yagi sandwiched between. Plans for 160 are to load the 80 foot tower shunt feed style against ground radials. That's a project for next summer.

Rigs consist of my old antique Drake C-Line and my old TS-430S mobile rig used as the primary rig. Amplifiers are the old SB-220 and my new Henry 3K Classic MK III (with 160). As you can see, I'm due for a new, modern radio in order to be competitive in contests.

Hope all is well with the guys in the club. Will try to get by to see them when next in Houston which now appears to be the ENTLEC Conference in March '91. Will keep you informed."

"My second DXpedition to Spratly Isl. is delayed and would begin early next year, because I've received a license to operate from Afghanistan. This has just been checked by the DXCC desk and was found acceptable by their requirements.

My callsign is YA0RR. I hope to start my operation at the end of December 1990, immediately after the necessary sum of money is collected. It depends on you how soon you can hear YA on the air. Your "green stamp" may be the last donation I need to start my operation from YA.

Incoming QSL Cards

The ARRL DX QSL Bureau consists of a number of separate call area bureaus that handle the incoming QSLs arriving from foreign countries. This service is free of charge and does not require ARRL membership. For the Fifth Call Area the address is: **ARRL Fifth (5th) District DX QSL Bureau, P. O. Box 44246, Oklahoma City, OK 73144.**

To claim cards ARRL recommends sending the bureau a number of 5 x 7 1/2 in. SASEs. To assist TDXS members in this Bob, AK5B, has obtained a supply of envelopes. He will provide 10 of the 5 x 7 1/2 envelopes along with a single 6 x 9 in which to mail them to the bureau for \$1.00. If you are interested, catch him on the repeater or call a day or so before the monthly meetings.

Full details about this ARRL service appeared in the June 1989 QST on page 72 under the heading "QSL Corner".

For those who expect to receive large quantities of cards here are a couple of suggestions. (1) Place \$1.00 postage on each 5x7 self-addressed envelope, (2) Have the post office stamp "THIRD CLASS" in the lower left, (3) Attach a label "50 Cards Minimum" beneath the "THIRD CLASS", (4) Put your call in the upper left and (5) Number the envelopes consecutively (so you will know where you stand as you receive them back from the bureau).

This approach will save a lot of agony with postage due and avoid small mailings which use up envelopes needlessly. The time delay in using Third Class won't be noticeable.

Outgoing QSL Cards

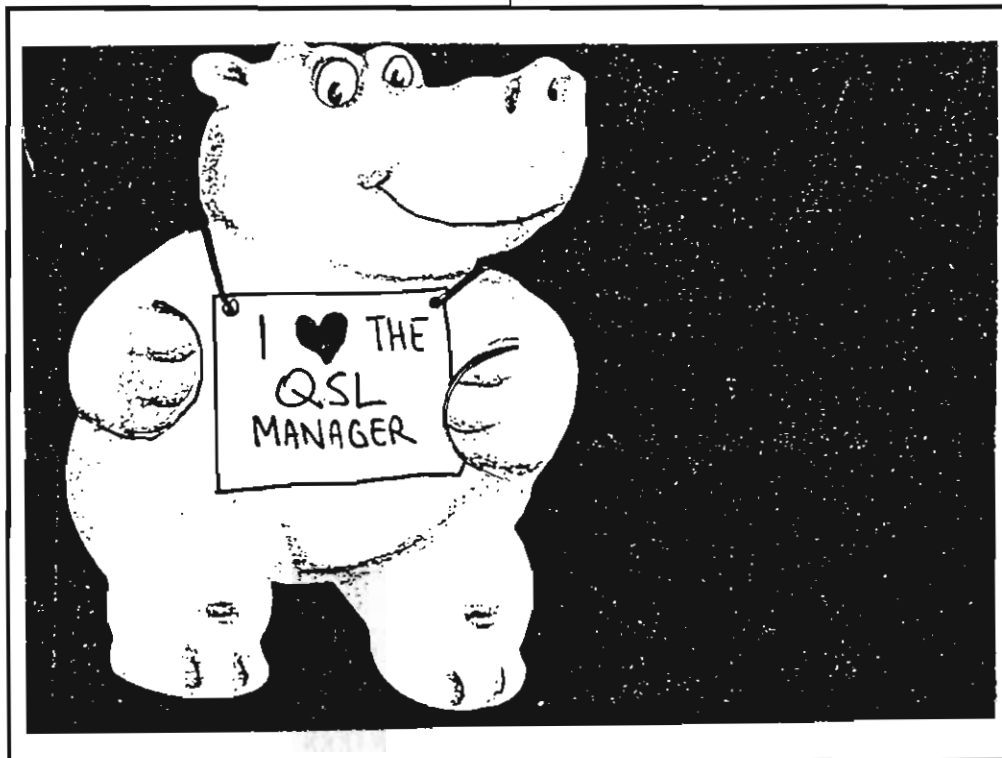
The ARRL provides a service to it's members which allows them to send DX QSL cards to foreign countries at minimum cost and effort. TDXS members can take advantage of this service by getting their cards to KG5U, who will in turn forward them to the ARRL Outgoing QSL Service. TDXS pays the nominal service fee of \$2 per pound as well as the postage.

Those wishing to use this route for their cards must sort their DX QSL cards alphabetically by country as shown on the ARRL DXCC Country List. This means that the prefix ES or LY goes with the Russians, XQ and 3G with Chile, AZ and L2 to Argentina, etc. However, it is not necessary to sort within a given country, i.e. all Russians may be lumped together, don't sort RA, UT, LY separately.

Keep in mind that QSL's for DXpedition operations usually go the country of the operator, e.g. JW9XG via LA9XG, 3D2XR via SM7PKK, etc. Many foreign stations have stateside QSL managers. These cards may be included with the "K's". By the way, most caribbean stations turn out to be non-residents, so send such QSL's to the operator's home country.

There are number of DXCC countries not served, e.g. many U.S. territories (KH3, KH7, KH9, etc.) and countries such as Taiwan, Egypt, Nepal, etc. A complete list currently appears in September 1989 QST, page 65.

Finally, each TDXS member must include his QST address label with each group of cards submitted. Contact KG5U if you have any questions (before you drop the cards on him!).
